We are praying to get funds for the project. God is our helper. We are planning to do it in phases. We want to put up a three classroom structure in the meantime which will be about \$7000. As we continue to pray for the Lord to provide funds for the rest. The Church has decided to help with the labor. At the moment we don't have funds to start the project. REPORT ON VEGETABLES DAY

The vegetables DAY took place at Run Mission International School on Tuesday 15th July 2025 at 12:30 in the afternoon.
